SEEN=SAVED ADOPTION EVENT

Sponsored by the Petco Foundation, the Seen=Saved Event was an ambitious photography and adoption event held at all seven LA County Animal Care Centers. Photographers from across the nation came to participate in the event, all with the goal of photographing every single animal in DACC's care.

In a matter of hours, over 1,200 animals were professionally photographed and would eventually be uploaded to DACC's website. Also to help promote the adoption of animals, fees were waived for all animals adopted during the weekend.



Thanks to the efforts of staff, volunteers, the Petco
Foundation, and numerous other partnered agencies, a total of **304 animals**were adopted during the weekend. That's almost double the number of adoptions compared to the same time period last year!

A ONE-YEAR JOURNEY

Olive, a five-year old female pit bull terrier, was first brought to the Baldwin Park Animal Care Center (ACC) in July 2018 as an owner surrender due to her owners having to move. After being assessed by DACC's behavioral team, Olive was determined to be friendly. Then about three months later, Olive was adopted by a new family.

Unfortunately, just one day after being adopted, Olive was returned to the care center because she didn't mesh well with the owner's other pet. As she patiently waited for her next family, Olive became known as a regular resident by the staff at Baldwin Park.

Over half a year passed but
Olive had yet find to find a
suitor, so she was transferred to
the Agoura ACC in February
2019. Again, however, no family
seemed to be interested in
bringing Olive home. After being
unable to find a home in Agoura,
Olive was transferred back to the



Baldwin ACC, hoping for a family to find her.

This time, Olive's luck did change. On July 27, 2019, Olive finally found her new family. And after a year in DACC's care, we're pretty sure that Olive was more than ready.

BOARD LETTERS:

On July 9, the Board approved a donation of \$25,000 from the Los Angeles Animal Care Foundation (ACF) which was originally granted by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA). The funds will support reduced adoption fees for large breed dogs at all LA County Animal Care Centers.

On July 9, the Board also approved a donation of \$450,000 from the ACF which was originally granted by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA). The funds will support reduced adoption fees for cats at LA County Animal Care Centers.

On July 30, the Board approved a donation of new play yards from the ACF for the Downey Animal Care Center, valued at \$180,000. Play yards give dogs an opportunity to exercise and socialize, help our staff become familiar with the social behavior of dogs in our care, and also promote dogs' adoption by increasing their visibility to the public.

On July 30, the Board approved a donation of \$36,000 from the ACF for the purchase and installation of automatic waterers at the Downey Animal Care Center.

On July 30, the Board also approved a donation of \$25,000 from the ACF to purchase supplies for the new Emergency Veterinary Response Unit.
