# DACC Earns Praise at the Productivity and Quality Awards


Our department was thrilled to be recognized by the Quality and Productivity Commission (QPC) this year at their annual Productivity and Quality Awards (PQA) ceremony.

The Annual PQA Program honors departmental productivity and quality improvement efforts deserving recognition. The 2023 Top Ten winners represent innovative ways to empower some of the most underserved, disadvantaged, and vulnerable populations in the County. These projects provided critical care and services during these challenging times.

DACC was honored to have won a Top Ten award for its Pets Are Family (PAF) Program. The PAF program is a multi-initiative intervention program that addresses the most critical needs expressed by pet owners in our communities and preventing the grief of separation for families who wish to keep their pets. These programs have directly benefitted thousands of pet owners and their pets since early 2020 and have led to fewer admissions at animal care centers, resulting in cost savings for DACC and its contract cities. The PAF program also helps control pet overpopulation and promotes public health by providing low-cost spay/neuter services. Each of these services provided by PAF is either primarily or fully grant or donation funded, receiving the support of dozens of partners such as the Los Angeles County Animal Care Foundation, the ASPCA, California for All Animals, Petco Love, and many more.

In a surprise announcement during the ceremony, DACC Director Marcia Mayeda, CAWA was honored with QPC's Chair Leadership Award. The Chair Leadership Award is awarded to a County department director who promotes innovation, efficiency, accountability, and integrity. In awarding this recognition, the Commission stated, "This year's winner leads by example and encourages creativity and collaboration and promotes efficiency in all aspects of the department. She is recognized as a national leader in her field. She is passionate about investing in leadership development to empower and engage staff to exemplify her department's mission, vision, and values. She has devoted more than 35 years working in the animal welfare field, leads the efforts of the Los Angeles County Animal Care Foundation, and is also the President of the Los Angeles County Management Council."

### **Lights, Camera, Adoption!**


#### Helping our pets get seen and saved
